
The Labyrinth Project by the Barwon River

The Story

This is a really exciting project as it is one way of embodying our purpose statement - Loving God: Growing Together, Partnering Community, Sharing Faith. The most recent part of the story behind this project is that a few members of With Intention (WH meditation community) were thinking about what could be offered to the wider community in the Advent Season that is meditation based and simple. An idea of installing a labyrinth down by the Barwon River was suggested, although at that stage it was unclear if and how it could be done. Most labyrinths in public spaces are permanent (ie made of stone, brick, hedges) or in some cases rolled out on a huge piece of material like we had in The Horizons Room back in July this year. Steve who is the Public Art Officer for Greater City of Geelong took the idea and canvassed it with a few relevant people at Greater City of Geelong. It was received with enthusiasm and quite quickly a project application for a temporary labyrinth at the end of Craigie Rd, Newtown, was put in and approved. So, the project is supported by the Greater City of Geelong, Corangamite Catchment Management Authority & Western Heights Uniting Church!

How Will It Work?

The labyrinth will be painted on the grass and available all through December for anyone to use at anytime. There will be a big sign next to the Labyrinth telling the community about the project, what it is for, times when people can come to walk it in a group experience, the organisations supporting it and a link to the WH website for more information.





What if I am not so Mobile?

Where the labyrinth is situated there is a carpark very close and a flat, easy path to the area. There are some picnic tables nearby also. Participating in the labyrinth walk by simply watching others can be a very powerful experience in and of itself. There will be some reading material provided and some online information which will further enhance the experience. So, please do come even if you feel unable to actually walk the labyrinth.

What is a Labyrinth?

The labyrinth is an ancient pattern found in many cultures around the world. Labyrinth designs have been found in pottery, tablets and tiles that date as far back as 5000 years. Many patterns are based on spirals and circles mirrored in nature. In Native American tradition, the labyrinth is identical to the Medicine Wheel and Man in the Maze. The

Celts describe the labyrinth as the Never Ending Circle. It is also known as the Ka bala in mystical Judaism. One feature labyrinths have in common is that they have one path that winds in a circuitous way to the centre. Labyrinths are currently being used world-wide as a way to quiet the mind, recover a balance in life, and encourage meditation, insight, self-reflection, stress reduction, and to discover innovation and celebration. They are open to all people as a non-denominational, cross-cultural blueprint for well-being. A very famous labyrinth in the Christian tradition can be found on the floor of Chartres Cathedral in France. If you're looking for more local examples, there are permanent labyrinths on the foreshore at St Leonards, at Queenscliff Uniting Church and on the grounds of Santa Casa, Queenscliff.



Labyrinth & Prayer


The labyrinth is simply an aid to prayer. The labyrinth is not a "maze" as there are no false paths or tricks to be overcome. Instead, we simply walk the narrow path to the centre, rest a little perhaps, and walk the same way out again. There is a wholeness, a completeness in this journey in, and the journey out. The labyrinth is a path that mirrors our spiritual journey, over a life-time, or when facing a particular concern or challenge, or when, in the here and now of today, we value this "tool" as a discipline of prayer over a half an hour or so – or as long as you wish. It is one way, among many others, of attending to our journey with God to that still point where encounter occurs and connections can be made - sometimes in a very mundane way ("down to earth"), sometimes in profound and mysterious ways. Action and reflection, walking and meditating, moving and being still, here are important elements of holistic Christian prayer. Walking the labyrinth provides a vignette of the pilgrimage of the heart to find its true centre, and a reminder that, having found "the still point of the turning world" (T.S.Eliot), we must take that stillness, that peace-filled centeredness, with us as we journey on. In Advent, walking the labyrinth is particularly powerful as we wait with hope for the coming of the Christ into the world.

Pas toral Care

Fed up with Christmas already? Racking your brain for ideas for gifts? Working through the Christmas card list? Christmas can be a joyful time and for some it is also a painful time.

At a time when family is emphasised, the pain of separation through death, divorce or some other circumstance is heightened.

The advertisements, enticing us to buy for our loved ones, give rise to a myriad of emotions in those struggling financially or those who have no loved ones.

People often feel pressured not to express 'bad' or 'sad' feelings, only those of happiness and joy. The reality is that for many, Christmas is a mixed experience with a hurting heart alongside the joy and wonder natural to the season.

So how can we care for each other pastorally at Christmas?

If you think that this Christmas may be difficult for someone ask them an open question like, "what are your plans for Christmas...?" LISTEN to what is said and not said.

Asking someone what their memories of the Christmas season are gives people the space to share both their joyful and their painful experiences of Christmas, experiences that may be colouring their expectations of this Christmas Season.

Allowing people to voice their pain, to say how hard they are finding Christmas, normalises their feelings and counteracts the romanticised image of Christmas time. It is important to recognise that the joy of Christmas can co-exist with the sadness the season can bring.

If Christmas is or has been hard for you personally, it may be helpful to share that fact, enabling others to be honest with the feelings they experience around Christmas.

People's support networks often shrink at this time as family, friend and others are on holidays. Help them think about alternatives they might turn to.

As Christians we are called to remember that our neighbour is not only the one to whom we are naturally drawn but anyone travelling on the road of life with us. Be mindful of those who need extra help or support, giving them your care and attention. Ironically, Advent is a time of waiting patiently and also a time of hustle and bustle. January is a good time to catch up on all those unfinished "I must get in touch with ..." from the previous year.

It <u>may be</u> helpful to refocus someone's attention from the popular picture of Christmas, with the Holy family in the picturesque stable, to other aspects of the Christmas story:

The first Christmas was marked not by abundance or stability but by scarcity and hassle. Mary and Joseph were forced to journey away from home, and had no proper place to stay when Jesus was born. They later fled to new lands to save the life of Jesus.

Those who first met Jesus were not the leaders of society but shepherds, people on the fringes. God comes to us whatever our status in society.

One wonders what Mary's in-laws thought of the situation. Mixing with the in-laws probably wasn't an easy time for her!

Jesus came to bring light and life to a dark world. Through the story of Jesus life we are aware that He knows only too well the feelings of isolation and sorrow. For Christians, the wonder of Christmas is not in what is materially provided, or in temporary joys that are created on the day. The message is of eternal hope, lasting joy, grace and peace. This hope and joy can co-exist with the natural sadness that may come with the season, and may help to bring strength and support to those suffering at Christmas.
