

Pas **t**oral Care – Palliative Care

Reading a recent blog, found at <u>http://www.huffingtonpost.com.au/entry/californi-is-the-first-</u> <u>st_b_12249344</u>, reflecting on the fact that "California has become the first US state to recognize that spiritual care is a standalone discipline in health care and has made it mandatory that a trained and certified Palliative Care chaplain be available for patients", brought to mind the questions: What does it mean if someone is receiving Palliative Care? What is Palliative Care?

Palliative Care has evolved from hospice care, based on the theories of Dr Cicely Saunders, first articulated in the late 1950s. After over a decade working with the terminally ill she advocated for the concept of multidisciplinary teams as the most effective way of relieving the "total pain" of a dying person in the context of their family. These theories were further developed and gained wider acceptance in the 1960s with the work of United States psychiatrist Elisabeth Kübler-Ross and her now classic book, *On Death and Dying*.

The term "Palliative Care" was coined by Canadian surgical oncologist, Dr Balfour Mount, in 1974, to highlight the concept of 'cloaking or protecting' the hospice patient, focusing on their quality of life as they journeyed to life's end.

Unlike these early beginnings, modern Palliative Care is no longer reserved for those at the very end of their journey of life. Whilst cancer is the primary diagnosis of most individuals, Palliative Care has been defined as "...the active total [holistic] care of people whose illness is not responsive to <u>curative</u> treatment..." (W.H.O. 1990).

The overriding focus of Palliative care is on helping people gain the strength to live as actively as possible and to improve their quality of life, by providing them with relief from pain and other symptoms and psychological, social, emotional and spiritual support - *whatever the diagnosis*. Palliative treatments may be used to alleviate the side effects of curative treatments, such as relieving the nausea associated with chemotherapy. Palliative Care may increase, reduce or stop, as needs change.

The team concept is still at the core of Palliative Care which is delivered by coordinated medical, nursing and allied health professionals and is provided, where possible, in the environment of the person's choice, be it at home, in hospital or in hospices. In addition to end-of-life care, admission to hospital or a hospice can be for a variety of reasons including: management of symptoms such as pain, nausea, etc.; rehabilitation; respite care for the family and/or patient.

In Victoria, you can request assistance, at any time after diagnosis, from a community Palliative Care service without a doctor's referral. Contact Palliative Care Victoria 03 9962 9644, <u>http://www.pallcarevic.asn.au/</u> for further detail.

If you're visiting someone receiving Palliative Care, consider the essentials of pastoral care:

- Actively listen with empathy.
- · Set aside your assumptions and allow the other person to lead the conversation.
- You may have questions you'd like answers to but remember they may not be ready to answer them.
- Be alert to their comfort level and respond appropriately watch for eye contact, bodily
 movement (turning away, restlessness) and disengagement from conversation.
- Keep an eye on the length of your visit. Too little time is preferable to too much time
- Don't under estimate the value of silence in a supportive presence.
- Ask if they would like prayer support via yourself, the Prayer Chain, the Prayers of the People and/or the Pew Sheet, and what they would like pray about and what detail they're comfortable to have disclosed.
- If necessary liaise with Audrey or Isabel for additional pastoral care.


