Summary of Church Council Meeting of 21st May 2025 at the new time of 3:30pm.

- Proposal from Wayne Jury to commence a Community Choir was endorsed.
- The videoing of our church services will not continue at this stage. Our thanks to Jenice Coots for her many years of service to this task. The audio recording will still be available.
- An offer from Bruce Waldron to update and maintain the WHUC Facebook page has been gratefully accepted.
- More work on the sound system has been carried out by Sharn and Bruce Waldron.
- Another meeting date has been confirmed to continue our discussions with St Lukes UC.
- Remuneration (travel allowance) will be paid to our supply pastoral ministers at the Synod rate during the period of Temukisa's absence.

Summary of Church Council Meeting 18th of June 2025.

CPR good Samaritans on call to save lives

An app that alerts members of the public to nearby cardiac arrest cases could save about 60 Victorians a year, new analysis shows.

The GoodSAM app enables triple-zero call-takers to notify users — any adult willing to provide CPR — when someone within 500m needs compressions in those crucial, early minutes.

New research has found cardiac arrest patients were 37 per cent more likely to survive to the point of hospital discharge when a GoodSAM responder arrived before paramedics or firefighters.

The study, published in the Medical Journal of Australia, analysed more than 9000 outof-hospital cardiac arrests from 2018 to 2023.

Researcher Belinda Delardes said just 6.5 per cent of the approximately 2000 triple-zero calls eligible for a GoodSAM response every year received one.

"We really want to boost those numbers," she said.

"If we were able to get a Good Sam responder to all of those cases before emergency services arrived, it would translate to about 64 additional survivors per year."

Ms Delardes, also a paramedic, said cardiac arrests in the community had a very low survival rate – just one in 10 cases left hospital alive – so any improvement was significant.

"Most people who have a cardiac arrest don't survive ...

and most of the time that's not because of anything that's happened treatment wise," she said.

"But when you can make a difference, it's just an incredible feeling."

The sight of Geelong grandmother Trish Fleming, reunited with Alex Pandik on Thursday, is proof.

He lives two streets away and saved her in February after waking up to an alert on his phone one night: "Ambulance Victoria needs your assistance. Can you help?"

He didn't hesitate and ran down the street to the address, where he found 75-year-old Bill Fleming performing compressions on his wife who had suffered a cardiac arrest.

Mr Fleming said he was incredibly relieved when Mr Pandik appeared on his doorstep, and took over compressions until paramedics arrived shortly after.

"I was very, very grateful when Alex took over, I was exhausted," he said.

Mrs Fleming, who was taken to hospital and is now recovering well, was incredibly thankful to her "angel" Mr Pandik and said her doctor couldn't believe she survived.

"Just everyone acting quickly, is what I think that amounts to," she said.

She said she has told countless friends about the stranger who helped saved her life, hoping to raise awareness about the initiative, particularly in rural communities.

"I'm just very thankful and grateful." she said.

Mr Pandik said everyone

should sign up. "If my neighbour knocked on my door and said, 'My husband is having a heart attack, can you help?" of course I would say 'Yes'," he said. "So why wouldn't I sign up to a program that can get me there quicker?"

Ms Delardes said "the vast majority of adults in our community are probably eligible" and hopes registrations increase, particularly in regional areas which have a larger alert radius. "Any CPR is better than no CPR," she said.

She said the person with the patient who has called triple-0 may be able physically unable to do CPR, or require a second set of hands – such as to lift a person from the bed to the floor – to begin. "The call-takers will walk you through what to do," she said.


