Students on a mission at space camp

Teens get first taste of astronaut training

Aref and Olivia Dowsley

Geelong secondary students Farzana Mohammad Aref and Olivia Dowsley were selected to join Mission Team Australia to travel to the world-renowned Space Camp at the US Space and Rocket Centre in Huntsville, Alabama. As recipients of the Endeavour Scholarship, an international STEM education program, Farzana and Olivia enioved immersive, hands-on activities inspired by real astronaut training. They shared their experiences with the Geelong Advertiser.

Farzana Mohammad Aref:

Travelling to the US as part of the Al Worden Endeavour Scholarship was one of the most unforgettable and inspir-ing experiences of my life.

Representing Australia and attending Space Camp in Alabama gave me a sense of global connection, curiosity and confidence I had never felt before. It was the kind of opportunity that challenged me in the best ways and reminded me how far curiosity and teamwork can take vou.

Throughout the week, we took part in everything from astronaut training simulations to problem-solving challenges.

One of the most memorable parts of Space Camp was tak-ing on the role of an astronaut,



all over the world at the US Space Camp in Alabama.

where I had to complete re-pairs "in space" while com-municating with Mission Control. It challenged my focus, patience and teamwork in a way I had never experienced before. It taught me how essential clear communication and trust are, especially under pressure.

The camp encouraged me to step up in ways I hadn't before. Whether it was helping teammates through challenges or learning to adapt when things didn't go to plan, I found myself growing every day. At the end of the week, I was genuinely surprised to receive the Right Stuff Award, which recognised eadership and resilience

It was a reminder that some-

times your efforts are noticed when you're simply focused on supporting others and doing your best.

One of the highlights was meeting astronaut Charlie Duke, who walked on the moon during Apollo 16. Hearing first-hand about the resili-ence and teamwork behind space missions was beyond inspiring. It reminded us that behind every major achievement lies dedication, curiosity and the courage to take risks.

Beyond the missions, meeting students from all over the world reminded me how powerful shared goals can be Even though we came from different backgrounds, our excitement for science, learning and the future brought us to-

opportunity helped me realise I want to be part of something bigger, something that blends science with purpose and uses purpose and uses knowledge to create real change.

Olivia Dowsley: The Endeavour Scholarship was a privilege to be a part of, and I am so grateful for the opportunity to meet and form long-lasting connections with every recipient and organiser.

Endeavour fuelled my passion for space, starting our journey with a tour of the Smithsonian museums Washington. It was surreal to see such significant pieces of history up close - from the Dis-covery shuttle to Neil Armstrong's spacesuit. Celebrating July 4th with my

new-found friends was equally mesmerising, as we shared stories about our cultures, similarities and favourite niches.

When we flew to Alabama for Space Camp, the experience became even more surre-al. From Monday to Friday 7am to 10pm, we trained like simulate microgravity, learn-

This experience made me realise that with dedication, anything is possible

NASA missions, experiencing the moon's 1/6th gravity and so much more.

We were also challenged through hands-on, team-based activities that taught us the key variables engineers must consider when sending astronauts

Most importantly, I met several astronauts, including Charlie Duke, who offered invaluable insight into the space industry, its accessibility and life advice I will always carry with me.

This experience made me re-alise that with dedication, anything is possible.

There are many pathways into the space industry, but none of them are possible without teamwork and an open mind.

This once-in-a-lifetime opportunity solidified my passion for a space career and gave me connections and memories I will carry with me forever.

HOSEA 11:1-11

When Israel was a child, I loved him, and out of Egypt I called my son. The more I called them, the more they went from me; they kept sacrificing to the Baals and offering incense to idols. Yet it was I who taught Ephraim to walk; I took them up in my arms, but they did not know that I healed them. I led them with cords of human kindness, with bands of love. I was to them like those who lift infants to their cheeks. I bent down to them and fed them. They shall return to the land of Egypt, and Assyria shall be their king, because they have refused to return to me. The sword rages in their cities; it consumes their oracle priests and devours because of their schemes. My people are bent on turning away from me. To the Most High they call, but he does not raise them up at all. How can I give you up, Ephraim? How can I hand you over, O Israel? How can I make you like Admah? How can I treat you like Zeboiim? My heart recoils within me; my compassion grows warm and tender. I will not execute my fierce anger; I will not again destroy Ephraim, for I am God and no mortal, the Holy One in your midst, and I will not come in wrath. They shall go after the LORD, who roars like a lion; when he roars, his children shall come trembling from the west. They shall come trembling like birds from Egypt and like doves from the land of Assyria, and I will return them to their homes, says the LORD.

LUKE 12:13-21

Someone in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me." But he said to him, "Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?" And he said to them, "Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed, for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." Then he told them a parable: "The land of a rich man produced abundantly. And he thought to himself, 'What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?' Then he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry.' But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God."
